



He had on hand a stack of literature to show us for example Ford Life, Fordiana Series, parts manuals, color chips etc. Ed pointed out some pit falls such as: Ford Archive photos are sometimes pre-production proto-types, Color chips from Ditzler and ohters aren't always identical to Ford's own chips, Ford parts catalogues produced long after the year of interest (the green Bible) often shows replacement parts rather than the original.


Also, the '32 judging manual is now available from the National for \$7.50.


