They all sound like good trips and great fun.

I would like to compliment Chuck Mair, Dave Sanborn and Pat Berry. Because of the new 1988 folders, Chuck was really under pressure to get the January Drive Lines out on time. He succeeded in doing so with a good margin. It was kind of Dave to bring the film for the program and certainly we appreciate Pat for furnishing the video equipment. My thanks to all of these good V/8 folks.

Our February program will be presented by Ralph Hubbard. Ralph needs very little introduction to most of you but for good order we will mention that he is a past national presi-

dent and also past advisor for the 1938 model year. Ralph will bring us a discussion about the development and interesting facts concerning the '38 Ford. This is a timely program for our club because it is the beginning of the fiftieth anniversary year for this model.

The March program will be the presentation of the 1987 official film of The Great American Race, which ran from Disneyland, Anaheim to Disney World in Orlando, Florida. The Club really needs this support so I would like to request again that we all be on the lookout for inexpensive, interesting parts (if there is such a thing) that can be donated to the Club. I am pleased to report that Bill Norton accepted our invitation to be auctioneer again. Bill and I both thought

that May 1st would be the best date to hold the auction. Our April meeting falls on Easter Sunday and it would appear that we would most likely get a better participation on the following meeting date which is May 1st.

Along the lines of income and the need for a successful auction, Larry Caplan presented a treasurer's report to the new officers. Larry's report brought out clearly that the drive lines cost more to publish than the revenue generated by the Club dues and that the comfortable cash balance left by the Ventura venture had declined down to \$1,315.00 before paying for the printer's January invoice. With this in mind, the new officers unanimously agreed that the dues should be raised to \$15.00 per year , effective January 1, 1988. I confess that raising dues after being formally in office fifteen minutes did not appeal to me, but after listening to the discussions, I believe an increase is in the best interests of the Club.

So far, we have twenty eight members that have paid their 1988 dues. We will sure appreciate the rest of the members mailing in their dues as soon as possible.



turned off at Mulholland Drive for a two mile ride into Seminole Hot Springs.

Hot springs.

The springs date back to the early days of the Seminole Indians. Today, visitors may enjoy its facilities, including a large swimming pool and a hot mineral bath, for the modest admission price of only \$1.25 on weekdays and \$1.50 on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. Comfortable cottages, including use of the pools, tages, including use of the pools, rent for a more \$7.00 per day for two people.

We'd suggest visiting the springs in the near future, as its owners are planning the construction of a five million dollar hotel within the next two years an activity that will surely in-

flate the now extremely reasonable rates.

Malibu Lake

While at Seminole, your HAPPY WANDERERS tolk a side trip to visit the remarkably scenic Malibu Lake. It is a short drive, and well worth the time taken to visit this wonderfully picturesque retreat—deep in the Malibu mountains.

Lake Sherwood

Retracing our steps along Mul-holland Drive, and turning on Decker Road, we drove a scenic five miles further to the fishing paradise of Lake Sherwood. Blue-gill, crappie and bass are among the numerous varieties of fish, seemingly, just waiting for the

Fishing rates are \$1.50 per person on weekdays, and \$2.00 on Saturdays. Sundays, and holidays. Row boats rent for \$3.00 a day. If desired, guests may bring their own outboards as long as the engines don't exceed 5½ horsepower. Private row houts twelve to exerctor feet. boats, twelve to seventeen feet in length, may be launched for a fee of \$2.00.

There is also a fine picnic area at Lake Sherwood, complete with tables, stoves, water and rest-rooms. Overnight camping or parking, however, is strictly pro-hibited. The only charge for use of the pienic facilities is a daily parking fee of \$1.00 per car.

Jungleland

From Lake Sherwood it is a short drive along Decker Road to the turnoff, beyond the Ventura Freeway, leading to Thousand Oaks and the Jungleland animal campound animal compound.

This is the largest compound for the import and export of jun-gle animals in the United States. Worldwide, it is the second largest enclosure.

Over 90% of all jungle animals used in motion pictures and tele-vision are caged here. In addition to wild animal shows for the young and old alike, Jungleland also features amusement rides for the children.




