





Member Spotlight: Jim Ellerbrock

In telling the story of the older cars that we currently own, it has a lot to do with my being a car nut growing up. Below is my car story.

History

I was raised on a farm in West-Central Iowa. Coming from the small town of Auburn of about 350, we knew everyone and they knew us. We also knew as kids, who owned what cars. This is how my interest in cars started at an early age. My Grandfather was Chevrolet man. My Dad started off with a new 1949 Chevrolet Fleetline (slanted back). He was very upset as it had a lot of mechanical issues. He then traded it for a 1951 Ford. He was a Ford man ever since. It also helped that one of his friends became a Ford dealer in the next town of Lake View). I remember our cars growing up very well. The '51 Ford was traded for a '55 Fairlane Club Coupe. That one was traded for a '62 Galaxie, and then a '66 Galaxie, and a '70 LTD. For myself, I started to drive a tractor when I was around 10 years old. I later learned to drive on my Dad's '52 International pickup (no synchronizers). As I became of legal driving age, I drove my Dad's new '66 Galaxie when he would let me. My Grandfather had purchased a new '64 Chevrolet Bel Air back in 1964. His health was declining and he passed in 1966. My Grandmother did not drive and gave me the car when I was a Junior in High School. This was my first car. The Good: a '64 Chevy 283 with 8K miles on it. The Bad: a tan 4-door sedan.

These are the older cars that I currently have:

1955 Ford Customline. (purchased in 1989). Remembering my Dad's '55 Fairlane, I saw this one listed in the paper. It was an older lady's car being sold by her grandson. It is a 2-door sedan, 272 Y-block with a Fordomatic. When I purchased it had 52K miles. It now has 67K miles. It has been repainted and interior replaced. The engine and transmission have only been serviced.

1965 Mercury Colony Park Station Wagon. (purchased in 1998). At this point in time, our kids were growing fast. We were out growing our '86 Mustang convertible. Val suggested that we look for an older Station Wagon. We found this one listed in Hemmings. It was somewhat local in Orange County. Found out that it had been turned into Chevron on their "Gas Guzzler" program. It had been rescued and was close to being sent to the crusher. We originally used it as a kid hauler. It was then used a "Picture Car" in various Movies and TV shows. In 2004 we drove it from Granada Hills (with 2 teenagers) to the Mercury Club's National Convention at the Indianapolis Speedway. We were able to take a lap. (One of the highlights of my car career).

1966 Ford Galaxie Convertible. (purchased in 2013). As I was now seriously thinking about retiring, I was also looking at convertibles. Again, looking at the Hemmings web site, I saw this '66 with 8K documented miles and it was located outside of Philadelphia. (This also reminded me of my Dad's '66). After a few conversations and photos sent by the sellers, (2 retired GM guys with this being their retirement business), I broke the golden rule and bought the car without seeing it and had it shipped. Luckily it was what they described. It even had original tires. It needed a carb rebuild, a new water pump and new tires. We try to get it out once a week or so. I've had it in numerous parades. It currently has 10K miles on it.

1969 Ford Mustang Coupe. (purchased in 1969). Val's parents bought this car new from Galpin Ford. It has always been in her family. She inherited it on the passing of her mother. The car has a 302 V-8 with an automatic. As the car had gone through a period of neglect, we decided to spruce it up by a repaint, new interior including a dash pad and a top of the engine overhaul. It has just reached 100k miles.

Although we do not have a Flathead, we really enjoy being part of the V-8 Club.

More "Spare" time than usual

With our 'normal' world pretty well slowed almost to a stop by the coronavirus situation, I felt the need to get myself in gear and do something, rather than just sit in my favorite chair and read, watch TV (and occasionally fall asleep).

It took a bit of self convincing, but I finally started forcing myself to go outside and check out my 'fleet' and choose at least one car a day to work on. I'll be honest, it hasn't happened every day. Sometimes, I just can't get motivated. Fortunately on those days, I've had other 'stuff' to keep me busy. Jerry Littner and I visited the guy who prints our club directory (before the 'lockdown') and delivered the membership database to him on a memory stick. We've been working with him since, making corrections and improvements and late last week we gave him the go ahead for printing. We should be mailing the 2020 club directory to you sometime prior to April 15th.

When I have gotten outside to work, I have accomplished a few things (some non Ford and some Ford). I replaced a broken heat riser valve and exhaust 'down pipe' on my '62 Studebaker GT Hawk. The car is much quieter now! I also replaced the turn signal flasher on the same car; it wouldn't flash at idle and when it did flash it was too quiet to be heard. Some of you have seen the Studebaker at our meetings and probably noticed the gaping hole in the right side door. Well, I finally replaced that door!

Then I decided it was finally time to work on my '55 Fairlane Ford Crown Victoria. For those who don't know, I acquired the car a couple of years ago. It hadn't run in at least 20 years. After I got it home, I determined that the engine was not stuck, so at least there was a chance it might run. Between the time I got the car and now, I had the starter rebuilt (fun job to remove and replace), replaced the oil pressure sending switch and bulb so I would know if I had oil pressure and replaced the battery and cables. At that point the starter would crank the engine but it wouldn't start. This week, to enable the 6 volt car to crank faster while I tried to resuscitate it, I disconnected the car's electrical system from the battery and temporarily installed a 12 volt battery. That meant I could crank the car faster without impacting (destroying) any of the car's 6 volt components. Then I went on to prove that I had a spark. After removing the distributor (not a lot of fun on a Y-block Ford V8), I cleaned and gapped the points and replaced the broken primary wire to the points. I poured some gas into the carb, cranked the engine and it sputtered a couple of times! Success, it actually tried to run. I quickly determined that the carburetor was not gonna be of much use until I could rebuild it, so I put out a couple of calls to fellow Valley V8s club members looking for a 2 barrel carburetor I could borrow. Don Stout came thru (Thanks Don!) so I quickly went to Don's house and picked up a 2 barrel Stromberg. After undoing a few 'Mickey Mouse' things a previous owner had done, I installed Don's carburetor and poured a little gas into it. I hit the starter and the engine fired and ran a for couple of seconds, but the temporary oil pressure gauge I had installed under the hood for observation, showed no oil pressure, so I quickly shut it off. Next step will be to remove the cover from the oil pump and see if the pump gears turn when the engine is cranked. I think the problem is probably that the pump 'lost its prime' and I'll have to pack it with Vaseline to get it to pump. Stayed tuned for Crown Victoria breaking news!
